POETRY IS...

- Poetry is the attempt to express the ineffable—to reveal the subtle truths about the human experience using words when even words aren't sufficient.
- Poetry is a collection of literary tools i.e. metaphors, similes...; by the application of one's abstract mind for the purpose of motivating others to think abstractly.
- Poetry is a creative way to vent.
- Poetry is a way to express feelings, thoughts and emotions through words. Poetry is the human experience transcribed.
- Poetry is everything and anything
- Poetry is a view point
- Poetry is complex, it can be viewed differently by everyone, there is no set guideline when reading a poem.

POEMS:

- Are divided into LINES and STANZAS
- Can have a regular rhythm/beat (METRE)
- Can have a regular rhyme patter (RHYME SCHEME)

TYPES OF POEMS

SONNET A 14-line poem that follows a definite **rhyme scheme**. There are two

types of sonnet: Italian (ABBA ABBA CDE CDE) and

English/Shakespearean (ABAB CDCD EFEF GG). The first eight lines focus on an emotion, while the last six lines focus on a response to

the feelings

BALLAD A poem meant to be sung, that tells a simple story (with a beginning,

middle, and end). Ex. "Cremation of Sam McGee"

ODE A poem meant to celebrate a person, subject, or object – in an

elevated and sincere style

HAIKU A traditional Japanese poem consisting of three lines and a 5 / 7 / 5

syllable pattern. The poem focuses on a brief moment in nature and

does not rhyme.

POETIC DEVICES

SIMILE A comparison using "like" or "as" (I twerked like rock star)

METAPHOR A comparison without like or as, interpreted by the reader (Life is a highway)

PERSONIFICATION Giving human qualities to a non-human object (The trees danced beautifully in the wind)

ALLITERATION Repeating the sound at the start of a word two or more times (People parked periodically)

THEME The central message, emotion, or idea within a piece of poetry

(Similar to other forms of literature)

HOW TO ANALYZE A POEM:

When reading a poem, consider the following six elements:

1. Thought

What is the overall idea or thought of the poem? What do you think it's about?

2. Emotion

What moods or feelings do you think the poet wants the reader to experience? In poetry, emotion is the main appeal.

3. **Form**

How does the poem appear on the page? Is it divided up in a meaningful way? Consider the lines, stanzas, and verse.

4. Sound

Does the poem have an appropriate sound? Does it rhyme or use poetic devices such as onomatopoeia, alliteration, or words that have an unpleasant sound to them?

5. **Imagery**

How does the poem use descriptive language to communicate an idea? For example, instead of saying "It was night," imagine a more imaginative, visual way of describing the same idea.

6. Descriptive Language

Are tools like similes, metaphors, or personification used to help readers understand the poem and its ideas?
