

PURPOSE:

You will review social issues, choosing one you find meaningful and important. Then, you will write a poem, (type of your choice) responding to this social issue. Your poem must make use of poetic devices and when analyzed, the reader must be able to respond to the “six elements of a poem.”

SUGGESTIONS/EXAMPLES:

-Homelessness	-Drugs and Alcohol	-Poverty	-Education	-Environment
-LGBTQ Rights	-Bullying	-Body Image	-Indigenous Rights	-Crime

1. Begin by doing some research. What is the issue? What are your thoughts on it? Consider main ideas, emotions, thoughts, etc.
2. Brainstorm words and ideas associated with the social issue
3. Look for poems/songs on your social issue as guidance if necessary
4. Begin writing out your poem. Don't be afraid to go back over it and make changes

SUCCESS CRITERIA:

- I will ensure that my poem can be analyzed using the Six Elements of a Poem guidelines
- I will divide my poem into lines, stanzas, and/or verses as I see appropriate
- I will use poetic devices/imaginative language to make my poem more engaging
- I will edit my poem in an appropriate manner
- I will write out my poem in a visually meaningful way, (font size; font; background; etc.)

SAMPLE POEM – “Strange Fruit”

Southern trees bear strange fruit,
Blood on the leaves and blood at the root,
Black bodies swinging in the southern breeze,
Strange fruit hanging from the poplar trees.

Pastoral scene of the gallant south,
The bulging eyes and the twisted mouth,
Scent of magnolias, sweet and fresh,
Then the sudden smell of burning flesh.

Here is the fruit for the crows to pluck,
For the rain to gather, for the wind to suck,
For the sun to rot, for the trees to drop,
Here is a strange and bitter crop.

Read the sample poem, “Strange Fruit” by Abel Meerpol.

- What is happening in the poem? Do all of the words/ideas make sense?
 - How does the poem make you feel?
 - What social issue is the main idea?
 - Consider Thought, Form, Sound, Imagery, and Descriptive Language for the poem. How do these elements add to the poem?
- This poem meets all of the criteria for a “good” poem. Take this into consideration as you develop your own.
